

MINUTES
Regular Meeting of the College Park City Council
Tuesday, May 22, 2007 – 8:00 P.M.

PRESENT: Mayor Brayman; Councilmembers Milligan, Krouse, Catlin, Perry, Fellows, Hampton and Cook.

ABSENT: Councilmember Stullich

ALSO PRESENT: Joe Nagro, City Manager; Janeen Miller, City Clerk; Suellen Ferguson, City Attorney; Steve Groh, Director of Finance; Terry Schum, Director of Planning; Elisa Vitale and Dorothy Friedman, Planners; Bob Stumpff, Director of Public Works, Bob Ryan, Director of Public Services.

The meeting opened with the Pledge of Allegiance led by Councilmember Krouse.

Minutes: Minutes from the April 24, 2007 Regular Meeting, the May 8, 2007 Public Hearing on 07-O-05, the May 8, 2007 Public Hearing on 07-O-02, and the May 8, 2007 Public Hearing on 07-O-03 were presented for approval. A motion was made by Councilmember Perry and seconded by Councilmember Fellows to approve the minutes. The motion carried 7-0-0 and the minutes were approved without amendment.

Announcements: Councilmember Krouse announced that he and Councilmember Milligan would host a public meeting on Thursday, May 31, at 7:00 p.m. at Davis Hall, regarding the Greenbelt Pedestrian Overpass Bridge.

Councilmember Hampton commended the College Park Woods Neighborhood Watch coordinators on a very successful picnic held last Saturday, and thanked the Council for the grant that made it possible.

Councilmember Cook echoed Councilmember Hampton's comments, and also stated that the first neighborhood party in Cherry Hill was also a success.

Acknowledgement of Dignitaries: Mayor Brayman recognized former County Councilmember Tom Hendershot and Maryland Municipal League President David Carey. SGA President Andrew Friedson was also in attendance.

Acknowledgement of Newly Appointed Board And Committee Members: The Mayor recognized Barbara Aldrich, a new appointee to the Advisory Planning Commission.

Amendments To The Agenda: None.

City Manager's Report: Mr. Nagro discussed the newly implemented automated tracking system for Councilgrams. He mentioned the Memorial Day ceremony at the Veteran's Memorial next Monday, May 28, at 11 a.m. On Tuesday the Mayor and Council will hold a Special Meeting at 7:00 p.m. with Capstone to discuss the downtown Parking Garage project. On Wednesday, May 30, there will be a meeting on the findings and recommendations from the consultants on the Route 1 Corridor Transportation Study.

Comments From The Audience On Non-Agenda Items:

Richard Biffl, 7002 Chansory Lane, Hyattsville, MD 20782, President, College Park Arts Exchange: He announced the year-end concert for the College Park Youth Choir on May 29 at 7:30 p.m. at Berwyn Presbyterian Church, and the Youth Orchestra on June 3 at 7:00 p.m. at Eleanor Roosevelt High School.

Presentations: "If I Were Mayor, I Would..." Essay Contest: The Mayor honored the City's outstanding essayists in the MML contest, Lauren Porter from Berwyn Baptist School, Simone Suite from Paint Branch Elementary School, and Suzannah Noyes from Holy Redeemer School, and the District 9 Finalist from Holy Redeemer School, Nehemiah Lawton from Holy Redeemer School. The fourth-graders joined the Mayor at the podium and read their essays. They were each presented with certificates and I "Heart" College Park T-Shirts.

Committee For A Better Environment Green Awards: CBE Committee Co-Chairs Deron Lovaas and Janis Oppelt presented Green Awards to Loren LaVoy, Rev. Richard Graham, Jackie Kelley, Lourene Miovski and Tom Bannister, Councilmember John Krouse, and City Horticulturalist Jan Van Zutphen.

Awards: Induction of Councilman John E. "Jack" Perry Into The Maryland Municipal League "Hall of Fame:" MML President David Carey and MML Board member Karen Hampton joined Mayor Brayman and Councilman Jack Perry at the podium. Mr. Carey presented Councilman Perry with a Certificate of Achievement and a lapel pin from the MML stating his induction into the Municipal Officials' Hall Of Fame for 20+ years of service as an elected official.

Mayor Brayman read a proclamation for "Councilman Jack Perry Day," which will be Friday, June 1, 2007. Councilman Perry commented on his 22 years of service on the City Council. This was followed by a recess for a reception to honor Councilman Perry.

Consent Agenda: The Consent Agenda consisted of the following item:

07-G-63 To Authorize The Mayor And The City Manager To Sign The Public Works Mutual Aid Agreement Between Various Municipalities In Maryland To Be Able To Aid Each Other In The Event Of An Emergency Situation By Providing Personnel, Equipment And Supplies

A motion was made by Councilmember Perry and seconded by Councilmember Fellows to adopt the Consent Agenda. The motion carried 7-0-0.

Action Items:

07-G-64 Approval, With Conditions, Of Preliminary Plan Of Subdivision For Mosaic At Turtle Creek

A motion was made by Councilmember Fellows and seconded by Councilmember Perry to support Preliminary Plan of Subdivision 4-06138 and requested variations 1-11 with the following conditions:

1. The proposed development shall generate no more than 210 morning peak hour trips and 240 evening peak hour trips, provided these trips can be safely accommodated by improvements to Mowatt Lane, as required, by Prince George's County Department of Public Works & Transportation.
2. The area for the private road shall be acquired in fee simple or be the subject of a recorded perpetual easement and reflected on the final plat.
3. Prior to signature approval of the Preliminary Plan, the applicant shall submit plans for improvements to Mowatt Lane to the Prince George's County Department of Public Works & Transportation (DPW&T) and shall work with DPW&T to finalize the proposed improvements at the time of Detailed Site Plan and building permit review.
4. The applicant shall obtain Storm Water Concept Approval from the Prince George's County Department of Environmental Resources.
5. The applicant shall diligently and in good faith pursue an agreement with the University of Maryland ensuring the availability of the UM Shuttle for residents and visitors of the project and shall provide a copy to the City.
6. At the time of Detailed Site Plan review, the applicant shall comply with Zoning Ordinance No. 17 - 2006, Section 2, conditions 2.a. – g., as well as the following:
 - a. Provide a written strategy to minimize the use of single occupancy vehicles.
 - b. Provide bicycle racks within the parking garage to accommodate a minimum of 10% of the units.
 - c. If practical, reduce the number of sewer connections to minimize the impact to the 100-foot stream buffer.
 - d. Evaluate the viability of providing a pedestrian connection from the building to the existing driveway adjacent to the Hillel Jewish Student Center.
 - e. If possible, provide for additional on-site woodland conservation and

diligently pursue providing required off-site mitigation along the Guilford Run Stream Valley.

Councilmember Fellows made additional comments.

William Shipp, attorney for the applicant: They are in agreement with the conditions in the motion except for one item in Condition #1. They would like to track the language in the zoning approval, which requires a study to be reviewed by DPW&T to ensure that Mowatt Lane can be upgraded to provide adequate access to the site. Thus, they request that the last clause of Condition 1 read, “provided adequate access can be safely accommodated by improvements to Mowatt Lane as required by DPW&T,” so as to substitute the words “these trips” with the words “adequate access.”

Ms. Schum indicated her acceptance of this revision to Condition #1.

Councilmember Perry moved the amendment and Councilmember Catlin seconded. There were no comments from the audience on the proposed amendment.

The amendment carried by a vote of 7-0-0.

There were no comments from the audience on the main motion as amended.

Councilmember Cook asked about the ability of non-students to ride the UMD Shuttle.

Councilmember Perry asked about the next steps in the development process, and how City staff will work with the County staff as the project proceeds. Mr. Shipp responded that the applicant goes to the County Planning Board on May 31, then to Detailed Site Plan. After that, they will come back to the Mayor and Council with the complete design of the project. Councilmember Perry asked if the applicant would state to the Planning Board that they accept these conditions as revised tonight, and Mr. Shipp answered, “Yes”.

Councilmember Perry asked how much of Mowatt Lane would be improved (per Condition #3). Mr. Shipp replied that would be determined by the study that they agreed to do and by DPW&T’s review.

The motion, as amended, carried by a vote of 7-0-0.

07-G-65 Approval Of Revised Architecture For Commerce Bank

A motion was made by Councilmember Fellows and seconded by Councilmember Milligan to approve the revised Detailed Site Plan 05099 for Commerce Bank submitted by the applicant to comply with condition #2 of the final decision issued by the District Council on March 15, 2007, with the following comments:

1. All street furnishings and streetlights shall be black in color. Benches shall be six feet in length and have backs.
2. Streetscape and plaza improvements shall be constructed as shown in a plan dated May 22, 2007 (attached). The pachysandra shall be replaced with a colorful perennial.

Councilmember Fellows made additional comments.

Dan Lynch, law offices of Knight, Manzi, attorney for the applicant: They agree with the motion with one change. In Condition #2, change the “colorful perennial” to specify “barberry.” Councilmember Fellows and staff agreed.

Councilmember Perry asked about the timing of this project with that of another Commerce Bank in the area.

There were no comments from the audience on this item.

Mayor Brayman commented he was pleased that the project is proceeding without the drive through windows.

The motion carried 7-0-0.

07-O-09 An Ordinance To Amend Chapter 110 To Increase Parking Meter Rates Effective July 1

A motion was made by Councilmember Hampton and seconded by Councilmember Krouse to adopt 07-O-09 to increase parking meter rates to 75¢ an hour effective July 1.

Due to the earlier Public Hearing, no further public comment will be taken at this time.

Councilmember Catlin raised the issue that the parking meter fee increase goes toward the proposed downtown parking garage, but the Council hasn't made the final commitment to the parking garage project. There was discussion about the timing of the increase vis-à-vis the parking garage, and exactly what expenses the increased revenue would go toward.

Councilmember Perry raised the question of the “Parking District” and asked that that issue be placed on a future worksession. Mayor Brayman responded that this would be covered in the May 29 meeting with Capstone about the parking garage project.

The motion passed 6-0-1 (Councilmember Perry abstained).

07-O-03 An Ordinance Of The Mayor And Council Of The City of College Park, Maryland to Adopt The Fiscal Year 2008 Operating And Capital Budget Of The City Of College Park, Maryland.

A motion was made by Councilmember Catlin and seconded by Councilmember Krouse to adopt the FY 2008 Operating and Capital Budget of the City of College Park. The Ordinance was introduced on April 24, 2007, and the Public Hearing was held on May 8, 2007. The Ordinance proposes no tax increase to the citizens of College Park.

Amendment #1: A motion was made by Councilmember Fellows and seconded by Councilmember Krouse to amend the FY2008 proposed operating and capital budget for the City of College Park as follows:

- 1. Increase Admin-Mayor & Council-Grants & Assistance-Public School Education Grants (account 1010-2538) from \$10,000 to \$15,000**
- 2. Reduce Admin-Mayor & Council-Special Events-NLC Public Safety Committee (account 1010-3869) from \$5,000 to \$0**
- 3. Specify that public schools receiving public school education grants are still eligible to apply for and receive community services grants.**
- 4. Specify that \$5,000 of the \$15,000 in the grant program will be distributed to College Park public school students and/or their schools, for schools other than Hollywood and Paint Branch Elementary Schools.**

Councilmember Fellows clarified that item #4 could be *any* public school attended by College Park students. This takes into account that 30% of College Park students do not attend Paint Branch and Hollywood Elementary schools.

There were no comments from the audience on this amendment.

Mayor Brayman noted that the evaluation parameters of the Public School education grant program are yet to be determined, and suggested that the parameters for this grant program be developed in conjunction with the community services grant program, and that these evaluation criteria be discussed at a worksession this summer. There was further discussion about the involvement of the Education Advisory Committee in the evaluation process.

Amendment #1 passed by a vote of 6-1-0 (Councilmember Perry opposed).

Amendment #2: A motion was made by Councilmember Krouse and seconded by Councilmember Milligan to amend the FY2008 proposed operating and capital budget for the City of College Park as follows: To redirect funds programmed towards a City-wide street crack and curb weed control program to include methods which rely primarily on mechanical removal of weeds and accumulated soil, rather than through the use of herbicides.

Councilmember Krouse received input on this amendment from citizens and the Committee For A Better Environment. The amount of funds allocated for this program is

\$22,000. The budgeted amount will not change, but will be redirected away from herbicidal treatment toward more environmentally-friendly means, including mechanical means and manual labor.

There were no comments from the audience on this amendment.

Amendment #2 passed by a vote of 7-0-0.

Amendment #3: A motion was made by Councilmember Perry and seconded by Councilmember Krouse to amend the FY2008 proposed operating and capital budget for the City of College Park as follows: To include the amount provided by staff under Engineering of \$65,000 to pave and improve the circular driveway up to Hollywood Elementary School, including the curb if needed. The funds should be taken from the undesignated reserve.

Councilmember Perry stated this driveway is graded at a #10 (the worst possible grade), whereas nothing in the City is worse than a #5 grade. The City does pavement well, and this piece of driveway is worse than the City standard.

Councilmember Catlin offered Substitute Amendment #3, which was seconded by Councilmember Krouse: The City would provide one-half of the cost of repaving the circular driveway if the School Board or County would provide the other half, not to exceed \$35,000.

Councilmember Perry asked what would happen if the School Board or County said no. Councilmember Catlin clarified that the project would not get done in this fiscal year, but could be revisited or become a CIP in the future.

There were no comments from the audience on this amendment.

Mayor Brayman asked what would happen if this repair project is already in the County's budget? Councilmember Catlin said the City should inquire of the County if this project is in their plans. The City would not pay for half of what the County is already scheduled to fix. Mayor Brayman asked what would happen if the school principal said that she would rather fix the leaky roof; Councilmember Catlin said no, this is only for the circular driveway.

The motion to accept Councilmember Catlin's Substitute Amendment as Amendment #3 passed 7-0-0.

Substitute Amendment #3 passed by a vote of 7-0-0.

The motion to adopt 07-O-03, as amended three times, passed 6-1-0 (Councilmember Perry opposed).

07-CR-03 Charter Resolution Of The Mayor And Council Of The City Of College Park, Maryland, Amending Article IV, “Voting And Elections”, § C4-2A “Registration Of Voters” To Clarify The Minimum Age Of Persons Qualified To Vote And § C4-6 “Runoff Elections” Providing For The Scheduling Of Runoff Elections.

A motion was made by Councilmember Perry and seconded by Councilmember Milligan to adopt 07-CR-03, Amending Article IV, “Voting And Elections”, § C4-2A “Registration Of Voters” To Clarify The Minimum Age Of Persons Qualified To Vote And § C4-6 “Runoff Elections” Providing For The Scheduling Of Runoff Elections.

Councilmember Perry stated that this resolution amends Sections 4-2A and 4-6 of the City’s Charter to specify that voters must be at least 18 years old on the date of election, and to provide for an alternative date when, due to Charter requirements, a runoff or special election falls on either a federal, state or city holiday, or on a federal or state election day, in order to avoid conflicts with other holiday or election events. The Board of Election Supervisors has requested this amendment. A Public Hearing was held earlier this evening, and the Chief Election Supervisor spoke in favor of these amendments.

If adopted tonight, this Charter Amendment Resolution would become effective on July 11, 2007, barring a successful petition to referendum by July 1.

SGA President Andrew Friedson stated that the SGA’s position is that the age for running for a City Council seat should be reduced to age 18.

The motion passed 7-0-0.

07-CR-04 Charter Resolution Of The Mayor And Council Of The City Of College Park, Maryland, Amending Article III, “Mayor And Council”, § C3-1 “Elected Officers Of The City” To Add A Requirement For Holding Elective Office; § C3-3 “Oath Of Office” Prescribing The Administration Of Oaths; § C3-5 “Election” Deleting An Extraneous Phrase; § C3-6 B(1)(A) Changing The Time Requirements For Holding A Special Election To Fill A Vacancy In The Office Of The Mayor Or A Council Member; § C3-6 B(3)(A) Changing The Time Requirements For The Withdrawal Of An Election Application; § C3-7 “Assumption Of Duties” Reducing The Time Between Regular And Special Elections After Which Officers Assume The Duties Of Office.

A motion was made by Councilmember Milligan and seconded by Councilmember Krouse to adopt 07-CR-04, amending Article III, “Mayor And Council”, § C3-1 “Elected

Officers Of The City” To Add A Requirement For Holding Elective Office; § C3-3 “Oath Of Office” Prescribing The Administration Of Oaths; § C3-5 “Election” Deleting An Extraneous Phrase; § C3-6 B(1)(A) Changing The Time Requirements For Holding A Special Election To Fill A Vacancy In The Office Of The Mayor Or A Council Member; § C3-6 B(3)(A) Changing The Time Requirements For The Withdrawal Of An Election Application; § C3-7 “Assumption Of Duties” Reducing The Time Between Regular And Special Elections After Which Officers Assume The Duties Of Office.

Councilmember Milligan stated this Resolution amends Sections 3-1, 3-3, 3-5, 3-6B(3)(a) and 3-7 of the City’s Charter. Section 3-1 adds a requirement that candidates for City office have been a registered voter in city elections for at least a year prior to the election. Section 3-3 amends the Charter to conform to the requirements of State law as to the administration of oaths, and vests in the Mayor the authority to administer the oath of office to Council members. Section 3-5 strikes extraneous language no longer applicable to terms of service. Section 3-6B(3)(a) changes the time in which a candidate may withdraw from an election. It would give the Board of Election Supervisors an extra 3 days to delete the candidate’s name from the ballot. By making this change, the Board’s schedule will not be affected by the intervening weekend, the Saturday of which is the 10th day before the election, the current requirement for withdrawal of candidacy. This change will allow the Board to mail accurate absentee ballots on the Friday, which is the 11th day before the election, rather than on Monday, the 8th day before the election. Finally, the change to Section 3-7 will shorten the time between an election and the assumption of office by the successful candidate. This is particularly important where an office vacancy exists at the time of election.

With the exception of Section 3-3, which is a recommendation of the City Attorney, the proposed changes were requested by the Board of Election Supervisors. A Public Hearing was held earlier this evening, and the Chief Election Supervisor spoke in support of these amendments.

If adopted tonight, this Charter Amendment Resolution would become effective on July 11, 2007, barring a successful petition to referendum by July 1.

The motion passed 7-0-0.

07-G-66 Authorize The City Manager To Sign The Memorandum Of Agreement With Mobility, Inc., DBA “Flexcar.”

A motion was made by Councilmember Cook and seconded by Councilmember Fellows to authorize the City Manager to sign the Memorandum of Agreement with “Flexcar”, to be in effect for five years: one year with four optional years.

Flexcar would assign two cars to downtown College Park and would explore additional locations in the City. There are currently two Flexcars assigned to the College Park metro station through an agreement with WMATA.

Ms. Ferguson stated that new agreements were circulated tonight that include the City's standard language, and there may still be some small changes. Ms. Ferguson requested that the agreement be approved in substantially the form as presented tonight, but that she be allowed to make some small non-substantive changes if necessary. There was no objection from Council to allow staff to work within those parameters.

There were no comments from the audience on this agenda item.

The motion passed 7-0-0.

07-R-14 Approval of a Resolution Amending The Homeownership Grant Program

A motion was made by Councilmember Catlin and seconded by Councilmember Fellows to amend the Homeownership Grant Program to increase the amount of the grant to up to \$7,500.00.

Councilmember Catlin stated that the City instituted the Homeownership Grant Program 1½ years ago, and although there have been many inquiries, only a few people have taken advantage of the program. This is a two-part program: the first applies to police, who always had the \$7,500 grant available to purchase a home. The second applies to the conversion of rental properties to owner-occupied, which was a \$5,000 grant. This is where the change would be. City staff has recommended that the amount of this grant be increased from \$5,000 to \$7,500. This Resolution incorporates the change in grant amount for applications received on or after July 1, 2007

There were no comments from the audience on this item.

The motion passed 7-0-0.

07-O-11 Ordinance Of The Mayor And Council Of The City Of College Park, Maryland, Amending City Code, Chapter 15, "Boards, Commissions And Committees", To Cross-Reference Chapter 127 And To Make Other Minor Changes For Clarification, To Amend Section 15-40, "Composition", To Delete The Requirement Of Representation On The Rent Stabilization Board From All Election Districts, And To Amend Section 15-51, "Voting", To Permit The Board To Act By A Majority Of Members Present And Voting; Amending Chapter 110, "Fees And Penalties", To Increase The Penalties For Certain Violations Of Chapter 127 And To Provide A New Penalty For Failure To Pay The Registration Fee; And Amending Chapter 127, "Rent Stabilization", Section 127-4, "Establishment Of Rent Ceiling", And Section 127-6, "Calculation Of Rent Ceiling After Initial

Registration Year”, To Alter Prospectively The Calculation For The Rent Ceiling And The Annual Increase Therein, Except In Prince George’s County Tax Assessment District 01, And To Make Certain Other Changes For Clarification And Efficiency Of Enforcement.

A motion was made by Councilmember Catlin and seconded by Councilmember Fellows to introduce Ordinance Number 07-O-11. He read the title into the record and noted that the Public Hearing will be held at 6:45 p.m. on June 12, 2007. Mayor Brayman requested that questions be submitted to the Clerk’s office in advance of the Public Hearing, and asked that the Public Hearing notice reflect this request so that questions may be properly addressed.

07-O-12 Introduction of Ordinance Number 07-O-12, An Ordinance Of The Mayor And Council Of The City Of College Park, Maryland, Amending Chapter 110 “Fees And Penalties”, By Repealing And Reenacting §110-1 “Fees And Interests”; And Chapter 141 “Nuisances” By Repealing And Reenacting §141-3 “Commercial Dumpsters” To Prohibit Placement Of Construction Dumpsters And Other Receptacles On Private Property Without A Permit, To Institute A Fee For A Permit And A Fine For Non-Compliance, And To Provide For Enforcement Of Fees And Fines.

A motion was made by Councilmember Krouse and seconded by Councilmember Perry to introduce Ordinance Number 07-O-12. Councilmember Krouse read the title into the record and noted that the Public Hearing will be held at 7:15 p.m. on June 12, 2007.

07-O-13 Introduction Of Ordinance Number 07-O-13, An Ordinance Of The Mayor And Council Of The City Of College Park, Maryland, Amending Chapter 172 “Streets And Sidewalks” By Repealing And Reenacting §172-4 “Use Of The Public Property”, To Limit The Time During Which Construction Dumpsters And Other Receptacles Are Permitted On Public Property.

A motion was made by Councilmember Krouse and seconded by Councilmember Cook to introduce Ordinance Number 07-O-13. Councilmember Krouse read the title into the record and noted that the Public Hearing will be held at 7:20 p.m. on June 12, 2007.

07-O-14 Introduction Of Ordinance Number 07-O-14, An Ordinance Of The Mayor And Council Of The City Of College Park, Maryland, Amending Chapter 87 “Building Construction”, By Repealing And Reenacting §87-19 “Appeals” To Allow For Appeal Of Fence Variance Recommendations To The Mayor And Council, And By Repealing And Reenacting §87-23 “Fences” To Clarify Certain Terms

And The Scope Of The Fence Code, To Allow For Chain Link Fences In Front Yards In Some Circumstances, To Remove Shrubs And Natural Growth Less Than Four Feet In Height From The Definition Of Fences, To Clarify That New Retaining Walls In Front Yards Require Approval Of The Advisory Planning Commission, To Allow Shrubbery On Top Of Retaining Walls, To Incorporate Certain Figure Drawings And To Make Certain Technical Changes And Amending Chapter 110 “Fees And Penalties”, By Repealing And Re-Enacting §110-1, To Require A Fee For Fence Appeals.

A motion was made by Councilmember Krouse and seconded by Councilmember Perry to introduce Ordinance 07-O-14. Councilmember Krouse read the title into the record and noted that the Public Hearing will be held at 7:00 p.m. on June 12, 2007.

07-G-67 Appointments To Boards and Committees

A motion was made by Councilmember Fellows and seconded by Councilmember Cook to appoint Mark Cook to the Committee for a Better Environment.

The motion passed 7-0-0.

Council Comments:

Councilmember Krouse commented on reports of crime in the North College Park area and said he will request that Major Davis attend a meeting of the North College Park Civic Association.

Councilmember Catlin commented on the meeting next Wednesday with the consultants who have completed the Route 1 Corridor Transportation study.

Councilmember Perry thanked the Mayor and Council for tonight’s recognition and commented on the “If I Were Mayor” essayists. He said that the City is not immune to crime going on in the region and that the community has to keep their eyes open.

Councilmember Cook commended Staff for the new Councilgram database.

Comments From The Audience:

SGA President Andrew Friedson: Thanked the Council for amending the timeline for Special Elections and commented on the 2007-2008 Student Liaison position.

Larry McNabb, 5107 Iroquois Street: Discussed his concerns about crime in his neighborhood.
